TAILORING SUPPORT FOR MARGINALIZED WOMEN



rs. Pratima and Madhu visited the Collector's Office in Chennai District to facilitate the allocation of sewing machines for six women from Manali New Town, Burma Nagar, and Sadayankuppam. The women underwent a practical stitching test, oral questioning, and verification of their original documents. During the process, it was identified that three of the women belonged to the Denotified Nomadic and Semi-Nomadic Tribes (DNC) group. The officer in charge expressed readiness to support them with material assistance for their livelihood and requested them to resubmit their documents to receive a special card provided by the Government.



The remaining three women also completed their tests and are currently under consideration for sewing machine allocation. They are expected to be called back in about one and a half months for the next steps. During the visit, it was observed that the Government offers several welfare schemes for vulnerable groups. The team also

met a supportive official who is actively working to assist migrant workers and the Irula community. This official expressed willingness to help these women register with the Welfare Board to avail of government benefits. The visit was productive, and the process for sewing machine allocation is progressing steadily.

BRIDGING GAPS, BUILDING FUTURES

EVENING STUDY CENTER FOR MIGRANT CHILDREN

Pudupet village in the Gummidipondi industrial area is home to a significant population of migrant families. Due to the transient nature of their work, parents often migrate in search of employment, leading to high dropout rates among their children. This issue is compounded by the children's inability to continue their education due to language barriers in the local schools.

Need for an Evening Study Center:

The establishment of an Evening Study Center aims to address the critical challenges faced by migrant children, ensuring they receive consistent academic support regardless of their parents' mobility. The center will provide:

Academic Continuity:

Supporting children to stay aligned with their school curriculum despite interruptions caused by migration.

Language Support: Offering language classes to bridge the gap between the children's native language and the medium of instruction in local schools.

Holistic Development: Creating an environment conducive to learning while nurturing the children's emotional well-being, social skills, and self-confidence.

Plan of Action:

Location: The center will be set up in Pudupet village, accessible to children from the nearby migrant communities.

Target Group: The focus will be on children aged 6–14 years who are at risk of dropping out or have already dropped out of school.



Activities:

- Academic tutoring in core subjects.
- Language enhancement programs.
- Recreational activities to promote engagement and retention.

Staffing:

Qualified teachers and volunteers fluent in both the local language and the migrants' native languages will be employed.

Collaboration:

Partnering with local schools, NGOs, and community leaders to identify and enroll children who would benefit from the center.

Expected Outcomes:

 The Evening Study Center is expected to:Reduce dropout rates among migrant

- children by providing them with a stable learning environment.
- Help children overcome language barriers and adapt to the local school system.
- Empower children with the skills and confidence to pursue education despite the challenges posed by migration.

Conclusion:

The opening of an Evening Study Center at Pudupet village is an essential step towards addressing the educational needs of migrant children in the Gummidipondi industrial area. By offering targeted academic and language support, the center will ensure that these children have the opportunity to continue their education and build a brighter future.



MIGRANT ENGAGEMENT INITIATIVES

WORKSHOP ON LEGAL AID FOR MIGRANTS

rom 27th to 29th November 2024, all DBMS staff actively participated in a workshop on Legal Aid for Migrants, organized at the Indian Social Institute, Bengaluru. The workshop aimed to equip participants with practical legal knowledge to address the pressing issues faced by migrants and to provide effective assistance in distress situations.

The workshop's objectives

were threefold: to understand the legal processes and proceedings concerning migrant issues, to gain hands-on knowledge of legal cases related to migrants, and to empower attendees to accompany and support migrants in distress through legal means. The sessions employed diverse methodologies, including expert inputs, group case studies, presentations, and constructive feedback from

resource persons and peers.

The inauguration on Day 1 was graced by notable figures, including Fr. Dr. Selvaraj, SJ, Director of the Indian Social Institute, and Fr. Anthony Dass SJ, Superior, among others. A keynote address on migration was delivered by Dr. Denzil, S.J., while Fr. Samir Minj, S.J., highlighted the purpose of the workshop, emphasizing its relevance to fieldwork.

Adv. Sushavya's session on compensation outlined the steps to ensure justice for migrants. The workshop concluded with an engaging session on media's role in covering migration issues, led by Prof. Renuka Phadnis, followed by an evaluation of the workshop's outcomes.



Outcomes and Impact:

The workshop was highly beneficial for the DBMS staff, enhancing their understanding of migrants' legal challenges and equipping them with the knowledge and skills to address these effectively in the field. The sessions provided a com-

prehensive understanding of legal proceedings, strategies for offering support to distressed migrants, and insights into advocacy and media engagement.

This workshop reaffirmed DBMS's commitment to being a reliable support system

for migrant communities, reinforcing the organization's resolve to facilitate rightsbased services and welfare programs for laborers. The learnings from the workshop will undoubtedly contribute to greater efficiency and impact in fieldwork




CREATING AWARENESS AND BUILDING TRUST

ADVOCATING RIGHTS FOR UNORGANISED AND MIGRANT WORKERS



n 25th November 2024, DBMS staff actively participated in the Unorganised Labour Union Yatra. a statewide awareness drive across Tamil Nadu aimed at highlighting the rights and welfare of unorganised and migrant laborers. The Yatra, themed "Vehicle Awareness Drive Across Tamil Nadu", marked the 77th anniversary of India's Independence and the 75th anniversary of the Constitution of India. It also celebrated Tamil Nadu's significant contribution to the freedom struggle and emphasized the role of workers and artists in society.

The Yatra, spearheaded by Mrs. Geetha Maa and her team, included awareness walks and meetings from November 9 to November 26, 2024, covering



multiple districts. Representatives from DBMS, including Srs. Pratima, Madhu, and Mr. Gopal, joined the Yatra at Chengalpattu at 10:00 AM and later continued the journey through Kanchipuram and Thiruvallur districts.

Key Objectives of the Yatra:

Creating awareness about the 10 mandatory registrations and welfare schemes under the Tamil Nadu Government's action plan for unorganised and migrant workers.



Educating laborers about their rights, including minimum wages, medical assistance, food security, childcare services, educational support, accidental death benefits, housing schemes, and livelihood opportunities.

Highlighting the importance of prioritizing children's education and government job reservations for laborers' families.

The meetings conducted as part of the Yatra provided a platform for unorganised laborers and migrant workers to voice their concerns. Many laborers shared their struggles and challenges, allowing the Yatra team to address their issues and advocate for stronger state intervention.
